# CHIEF'S MESSAGE

Dear Citizens of Brookville,

We are excited to present the 2023 Annual Report for the City of Brookville Police Department. Each year we strive to provide a basic overview of accomplishments and challenges that we have faced over the last year. This year we were able to provide a stronger emphasis on crime prevention and community policing. We also increased our foot patrols, business checks, traffic enforcement, as well as educational and social media campaigns intended to combat local and nationwide crime trends.

Each year we face new challenges and consequently search for ways to overcome these challenges based on our available resources. This year we were able to take proactive steps towards keeping our officers safer when responding to critical or active shooter incidents. These local and nationwide incidents continue to increase and present our law enforcement officers with daily threats and safety concerns. Thankfully, due to a generous donation by the Green Tokai Company and budgeted funds, we were able to purchase a large ballistic shield as well as mini ballistic shields for each cruiser, which can be used during critical or active shooter events.

This year, local and nationwide communities faced a dramatic increase in thefts from vehicles and stolen vehicles alike. In response, we adopted the nationwide Lock It or Lose It Campaign. This campaign reminds our citizens of the dangers of not removing valuables from vehicles, as well as leaving them unlocked, unattended, and not removing the keys. These mistakes have led to a staggering 100% increase in thefts as well as a 200% increase in motor vehicle thefts. We continue to encourage our citizens to call the police immediately when observing suspicious activity and not creating social media posts as a first and only option of reporting suspicious activity and crimes.

In closing, it remains a pleasure and honor to serve as your police chief. I will continue to meet and exceed the expectations of our community. I remain determined to seek and provide the men and women of the City of Brookville Police Department the tools, technology, and training needed to perform their duties in a rapidly changing society.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Police Department remained fiscally responsible and operate under budget.
- We received \$5,161.28 in grant funding from the Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program.
- We received a \$3,950.00 donation from the Green Tokai Company to purchase a ballistic shield for critical or active shooter incidents.
- We received a \$5,000.00 donation from the Smith Family Foundation to focus on providing resources to underserved/at risk you within our community and resources to those who serve and have served our country.
- We received \$10,905.27 reimbursement from the Ohio Attorney General for Continuing Professional Training.
- We purchased and launched the Cordico Shield Wellness App for Law enforcement Officers in 2023. This provides a mental and physical wellness solution for police officers 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 days a year. The funding for this project was received from a grant opportunity provided by the State of Ohio.
- We purchased and launched the Lexipol Police One Training Academy for police officers, which provides our police officers with more than 1500 training modules and videos annually.
- We purchased mini ballistic shields for each of our police cruisers for critical or active shooter incidents.
- We increased annual training hours by 4%.
- We increased business foot patrols by 78%.
- We increased traffic enforcement and traffic stops by 80%.
- We continued our support of Charity Events - Shepherd's Hands and FISH Food Bank, Adopted over 20 families for Christmas, and provided meals for several families.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- We maintained a Proactive History of Criminal Justice Reform document which provides a transparent overview of our reform efforts dating back to 2000.
- We continue to maintain Lexipol policies associated with criminal justice reform. In 2022, we received the 2022 Lexipol Gold Standard Award. Award presented in 2023.
- We maintained Certification in Ohio Collaborative Standards.
- Completed Community Engagement Events: Veterans Day Lunch at Rob's, Good Night Lights at Dayton Children's Hospital, Pink Ribbon Girls 5K Walk, Pink Ribbon Girls Pink Badge Project, Ghostly Night Out, Coffee With A Cop, Amvets Ride To The Wall, Baseball Parade, Soccer Parade, and Homecoming Parade, Community Picnic Crime Prevention Booth, Boy Scout Events, Neighborhood Watch Programs, Active Shooter Presentations, Lights, Sirens and Pizza, Whole Child Event, Walk to School, Donuts for Dad's, and Career Day, Bike Helmet Program, Halloween Safety Presentations, Community Pre-School Trike-A-Thon, DEA Drug Take Back Day, and more.
- We received and distributed FREE Steering Wheel Locks from KIA.
- We adopted the nationwide Lock It or Lose It Campaign.

## EDUCATION AND TRAINING ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Captain Morgan continues to pursue his BS in Criminal Justice at Columbia Southern University.
- Firearms Training Sessions: State Qualifications, Active Shooter Response, and more.
- All officers were re-certified in Less Lethal Use of Force Options which includes Pepper Ball Guns and Shot Gun Bean Bag Rounds.
- Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy - Continuing Professional Training (24 hours per officer). The topics included: Legal Updates, Arrest, Search and Seizure, Ohio School Threat Assessment , and a broad range of other law enforcement topics.
- Officers received the following training components: Use of Force, Taser Refresher, CPR & AED, First Line Supervision, Field Training Officer, Evidence Technician Training, Montgomery County Prosecutor's Office Law Enforcement Seminar, Pistol and Rifle Instructor Courses, and 4,433 DTB's (Daily Training Bulletins). Overall, we completed 1274 training hours.

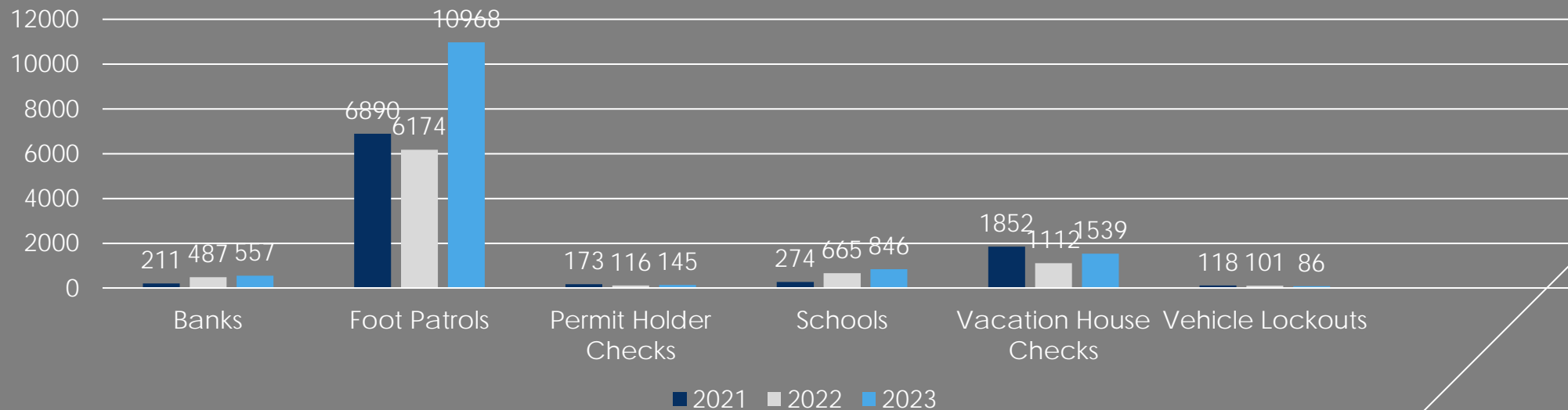

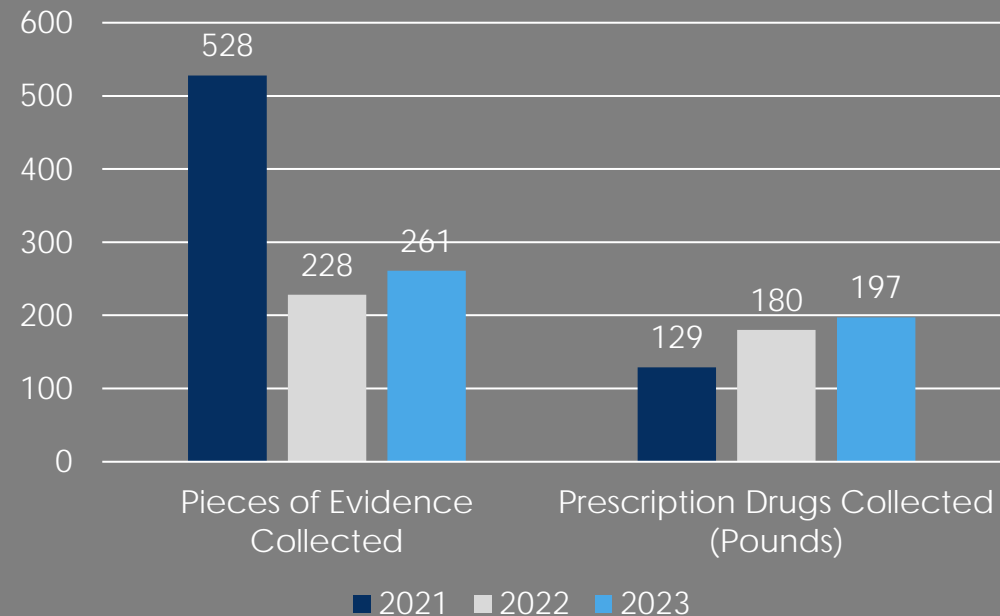

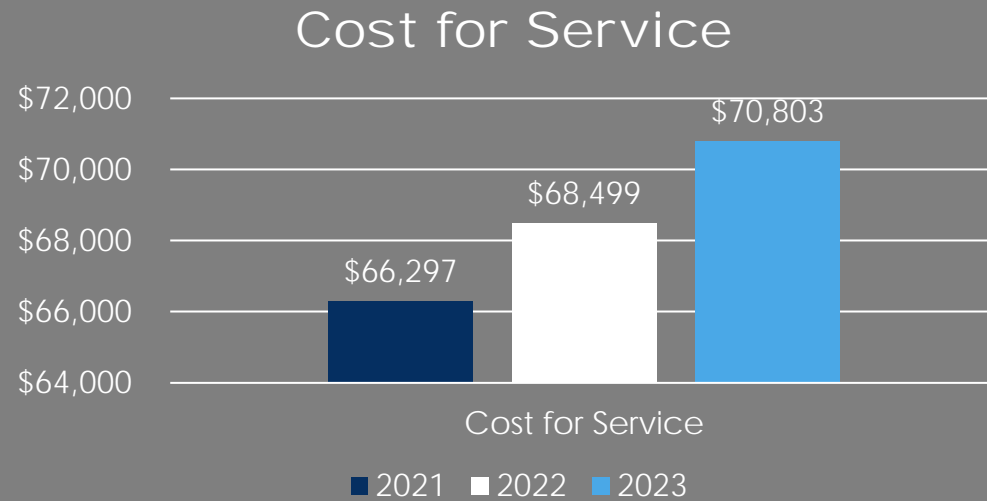
